## What is the LAUNCH Curriculum?

DU's LAUNCH Curriculum is designed to heinsternational students and students whose first language is not English be moneccessful in their candemic programs. The urriculum focuses on improving English language proficiend parning to participate in an exploring time ances of U.S. culture.

#### Why is LAUNCH required?

As part of the Common Curricultuat DU, most undergraduate setuds must complete a foreign language requirement. Based on a proficiency acceptent test, students students students 4, 8, or 12 language credits in order to fulfthis part of the Common Curriculum.

For international students who identify that Ertigliss not their first language, this requirement is fulfilled by taking 4, 8, or 12 credits in DU's LAUCH curriculum. Students' scores on TOEFL, IELTS, or the DU English Language of ficiency Assessment (ELPA) etermine students' placement into the courses of the LAUNCE urriculum. Students receir credit toward their degree and fulfill the foreign language requirement taking these English courses.

#### Who has to take courses ime LAUNCH curriculum?

All international students two are non-native speakers of Englisse required to take at least one course in the LAUNCH Curriculum.

<u>Exception</u>: Transfer students admitted from anododege or universitywhere English is the universal language of instructionary be waived from taking LAUNC dourses if they have completed at least 30 transferable senterest redits OR have taken bottlinglish Composition I and English Composition II and earneed C- grade or higher.

What are the LAUNCH courses about?

ENGG 1100: Exploring US Culture -Designed as a foundational coeffor international students, this course examines the dynamic nature of US reult@/hile acquiring a language the first step for successful integration into a nonneticountry, it is only the beginnin@nce the language is acquired, one must learn the dynamic and plicatic nuances every culture hastudents are introduced to the pluralistic nature of contemporaAmerican values and reflect on homese values teract. Students are also given the opportunity tockete their culturadentity and role inthe greatemulticultural community at DU.

ENGG 1080: Speaking Strategically Designed as a foundational cseifor international students, this course prepares students to effectively incounicate orally for a variety of academic purposes. Through the use of content selected by the instructudents learn to styhesize information from a variety of different sources, detir a critical and comprehensible pared presentation, initiate successful oral discussion strategies during class discrussions, and critical by ontribute to a variety of academic conversations. Students also expected to demonstrate ability to critically listen and respond to sustained the success.

ENGG 1090: Writing that Matters - Designed as a foundational coufseinternational students, this course prepares students to effectively municate through writing for variety of academic purposes. Through the use of content selected by structor, students least o synthesize texts, critically respond to a variety of ource materials, critically write in a way that contributes to the greater academic discussion, and paralwritten texts of various genraed styles according to author purpose, audience, and way for easing or logic.

How is placement into LAUNCH courses determined?

All international students who anon-native speakers of Englishe required to take ENGG 1100: Exploring US Culture.

For students who submit TOEFL or IELTSoses for admission, placement into ENGG 1080: Speaking Strategically and ENGG 1090/riting that Matterswill be based on the sub-scores in the relevant skill areas:

Students who submit a qualifying Carindoge English: Advanced (CAE) it a grade of C or above will not be required to trace ENGG 1080 or ENGG 1090.

Students who do not submit TOEFL, IELTS, or CAE **escr** admission will be equired to take DU's English Language Proficiency Assessment (ELRA) placement into AUNCH courses. Students who do not submit test scores or complete the AE will be automatically placed into all three LAUNCH courses.

### What is the ELPA, and how is it administered?

All students are asked to provide iting and speaking samples by respinged specific prompts. The writing and speaking samples are complete line prior to arrival on campustudents who are required to take the ELPA will be emailed instructions for completing the assessment online

Each student's writing and speaking samples cavie wed by two ENGG is tructors to assess the student's ability to communicate a manner that can be easily understood by a native speaker of English.

For Reading/Writing, the instructs evaluate the student's:

- o ability to organize their thoughts
- o ability to develop and upport their main ideas
- o ability to reference a source text appriately paraphrasing, quoting, etc.
- ability to use word forms, vocabulary, and modex sentence structes at a level of sophistication appropriater university study
- ability to use correct sentence strueturord order, grammar, punctuation, sentence variety, and transitions.

For Speaking/Listening, the instators evaluate the student's:

- o speaking fluency
- o pronunciation and **co**prehensibility
- o ability to interact spontaneouslyith native speakers of English
- o ability to develop ideas and contribute conversations on academic topics
- o ability to listen effectively and respond appropriately ltoe or recorded information
