RECENT CHANGES IN CDC RECOMMENDATIONS

What's changed in the updated CDC's recommendations?

According to the CDC, when should individuals get a COMIDest? Will this be different for DU community members?

According to the CDC, individuals should seek testing when they are either symptomatic or have a known or suspected exposure to someone with COVID9.

DU will continue to contact trace exposures within the DU community and all community members identified as a close contrait the required to test on days 1, 3, and 5 from exposure. Aggressive and more frequenttesting identifies pre-existing infections the person was unaware of and day 3 testing is currently when mpstitives are identified.

How is this different from other recent quarters/semesters? How will DU's approach differ from the CDC's guidelines?

Unlike the start of recenquarters/semesters, DU will not require arrival testing prior to the start of the school yeanowever, DU will continue to make testing available at the Carrel (only), free of charge 6 days a week unday through (closed on Saturday) ease see the SpitLab website for operating hos DU will also retain our ontact tracing team, following up with individuals who test positive and alerting any close contacts of their required testing schedule to wear a mask for 10 days from exposure.

What should members of the DU community expect if exposed to COVID19?

DU requires anyone identified as a close contact to be tested at the Spit Lab as soon as possible and then again, every other day until day 5—example, testing on day 1, 3, and 5 after an exposure. This approach increases our ability to detect the virus and swiftly isolate individuals, protecting the virus from spreading further within our community. DU

will also follow the CDC guidance and let everyone who is a close contact know that they are expected wear a maskwhenindoorsfor 10-days after exposure the safety of others

How does this compare to the CDC's recommendations?

The CDC recommends that those who have been exposed to an infected person wear a mask for 10 days around others when indoors in public. They should also test for COMDat least five days after exposure (or sooner if they are symptomatic), irrespective of their vaccination statusDUrequires day and 3testing in addition to day 5 testing to identify infections earlier when exposure to others can be prevented and so that treatment can be most effective.

have some degree of protection against seveliness from their previous infection" CDC report dated August 11, 20 Consistent with DU policies implemented over the summer, we are not differentiating required protocols based on vaccination status at this tillease note that the CDC still strongly recommends topedate vaccination as a protection for the individual from serious illness and for the community and DU follows these recommendations by requiring toppdate vaccination or exemption.

Now that there is no mandatory testing how will DU monitæmd track outbreaks?

Beginning August 1, instead of mandatory testing, DU will follow a COVID19 cutbreak management process as our revised approach to controlling the spread of COVID9. DU will continue to monitor positivity rates and outbreaks on campus and will require DU community members to undergo mandatory testing in the following situations:

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Emails requiring testing at the poole sent topeople connected to the outbreak. Ifyou are part of a class or department experiencing outbreak, you will receive a notification. Testing continues for multiple days as does wearing a mask until two well-axes passed with no further positives.

The University is required to report all positive cases to the Denver Department of Public Health and Environm@DPHE)DDPHE work with DU's ontact tracers, the public health project manager, and the executive director ofenterprise risk managemento determine if there are confirmed and related COVID positive cases within units or classes.

CDPHE determines when an outbreak is closed.

What is faculty's role with enforcementor students?

Instructors and staff suspecting a violation has occurred may use the following progressive measures to address student-**oom**pliance:

- 1. Ask the student to comply with the requirement for which a violation has been observed. For example, ask the student to "Please report your positive test to reportCOVID@du,endask and isolate immediatelÿ
- 2. Submit a COVISpecific Incident Reporto the Office of Student Rights & Responsibilities (SRR), providing details about the incident.
